GENERAL NEWS:

ASH WEDNESDAY ~ 18th February 2026. A day of Fast and Abstinence. It is not a Holy Day of Obligation, so there is no obligation to attend Mass, but often people like to receive the blessed Palm ashes, used to mark the beginning of Lent. There will be 3 Masses in the community. 9.30am Immaculate Conception, Stroud, 12noon The Annunciation, Woodchester and 7.00pm St Joseph's, Stonehouse. Ashes will be blessed and distributed at all Masses.

FASTING: The Church requires all Catholics from ages 14-59 to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. As long as you are in good health, this means that you should only eat one full meal, plus two smaller meals that do not equal a full meal.

ABSTINENCE: Another powerful invitation to grow in your spiritual life is abstaining from meat. Catholics age 14 and older do not eat meat on Ash Wednesday and all Fridays during Lent, including Good Friday. Instead of meat many Catholics choose to eat fish instead. No matter what your circumstances are, Lent is a powerful invitation to create small sacrifices, making yourself 100 percent available to God. One traditional Catholic sacrifice is giving up meat on Fridays during Lent, but if you or someone you know is a vegetarian, Fridays in Lent are an opportunity to make an alternative sacrifice. Some vegetarians might choose to give up sweets, coffee, or seasonings on Friday instead.

STATIONS OF THE CROSS: A traditional Lenten liturgy is the Stations of the Cross. These services will help you to celebrate one of the observances attached to Lent ~ Prayer. The Stations of the Cross can be celebrated as personal prayer, in groups and also as a more 'formal' service. Deacon Bogdan, Deacon Steve and Fr Eugene will celebrate the Formal Service of the Stations of the Cross in our Churches during Lent. **Wednesday 19th Feb. 7.00pm Immaculate Conception: Tuesday 24th Feb. 7.00pm St Joseph's: Tuesday 3rd March 7.00pm The Annunciation: Tuesday 10th March 7.00pm Our Lady & St Therese. Wednesday 18th March 7.00pm Immaculate Conception: Wednesday 25th March 7.00pm St Joseph's: Wednesday 1st April 7.00pm The Annunciation.** Previous practices of the Stations are still able to be celebrated outside these times.

LENT MASS FOR THE ANOINTING OF THE SICK: Sunday 22nd March 3pm St Joseph's, Stonehouse. (This will also be a Sunday Mass and will fulfil your obligation to attend Sunday Mass).

CHRISM MASS: Wednesday 1st April 11.00am Clifton Cathedral. This is a Mass celebrating the Sacramental priesthood and the Royal priesthood of all. Together, with Bishop Bosco, there will be Priests, Deacons, Religious and People from all the Diocese gathered in the Mother Church of the Diocese, The Cathedral of St Peter and Paul, Clifton. During the Mass the priests and deacons will renew the commitment to their ministry. Also, the Oils to be used in the celebration of the Sacraments will be blessed by Bishop Bosco. The Oil of Catechumens used in the Sacrament of Baptism. The Oil of the Sick for the Anointing of the Sick, and the Bishop and Priests will Consecrate the Oil of Chrism, used in the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and Ordination. The Oil of Chrism is also used to consecrate Bishops, Churches, and Altars. If you would like to attend this Mass, there will be a Coach from the three parishes. **It will pick up from and return to Stroud and Stonehouse. Details of cost and timings will be available soon. SHARING THE WORD

FIFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME 'A'

First Reading: Is. 58:6-10 Isaiah has been talking about fasting. He tells the people that true (and therefore true religion) is necessarily linked with the practice of justice and with concern for the poor and the needy. Here he assures them that if they follow this way their lives will become luminous. This is the connection with the Gospel.

Second Reading: 1Cor.2:1-5 Paul is at pains to convince the Corinthians that their fascination with worldly wisdom and rhetorical skills can only weaken their faith. He points to himself as an example. When he brought the Gospel to them, he didn't rely on human cleverness. He came in weakness, preaching a crucified (and risen) Christ, to show that their faith doesn't depend on human cleverness but on the power of God.

Gospel Reading: Mt 5:13-16 Matthew has already introduced Jesus as the light of a darkened world. Now the function of enlightening and guiding a morally confused humanity is shared with his disciples. Salt and light are powerful images. In the ancient world, salt was one of the most important necessities of life, especially for preserving and seasoning food. So too was light for obvious reasons. Both images are making the same point: Christians are called to bear witness to Christ before unbelievers through their good deeds. When the disciples stop witnessing through their deeds, they become as useless as salt that has lost its taste or a lamp that doesn't give light.

SIXTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME 'A'

First Reading: Eccles 15:15-20 Sirach presents obedience to God's law as the road that leads to life, and rejection of that law as the path to death. The choice is set before man: he can opt for life or death. The New Testament good news of grace generously poured out in Christ will transform this stark and forbidding morality.

Second Reading 1Cor 2:5-10 Christians have a wisdom unknown to others. True wisdom comes from God and reveals the wonderful things God has prepared for those who love him.

Gospel Mt 5:17-37 In this section of the Sermon on the Mount, Matthew illustrates Jesus' attitude to the Law. Jesus does not dispense with the Law but asks for a deeper observance of it. Every small part of it is to remain, but only as radically interpreted by Jesus. His justice far surpasses the legalistic approach of the scribes and Pharisees. For the Pharisees the letter of the Law was everything. Jesus proposes new standards of goodness for his disciples. It is not enough for them to become better Pharisees. This justice is made explicit in six concrete examples. These (called antitheses) deal with murder, adultery, divorce, oaths and vows, retaliation, and hatred of enemies. The first four are dealt with in today's Gospel, the other two in next Sunday's Gospel. Murder and adultery are born in the heart. Jesus reinterprets the fifth commandment so that it embraces those angry feelings and emotions that may lead up to murder. And he reinterprets the sixth commandment so that it embraces lustful thoughts and desires that may lead to sexual sin and infidelity. As for oaths: he encourages his disciples to behave in such a way that oaths are superfluous. The disciples are simply to be truthful. Jesus' intention is to bring us beyond legalism and a literal interpretation of the law (the problem with the scribes and the Pharisees) and into the spirit of the law.
